

5. **The Ephesians 5:19 Use Of Psallo** “Speaking to yourselves in _____ and hymns and spiritual _____, singing and making melody in your _____ to the Lord.” The two words *making melody* are translated from “*psallontes*” which is a derivative of *psallo*. It is a verb. A verb must have an object. The object of the verb is not a part of the definition of the verb. Example: I hit the ball. *Hit* is the verb. *Ball* is the object. Correct? _____ *Ball* is not the definition of *hit*. In the case of (Eph 5:19) the object is the heart. He “makes melody” (ie: psallos) in the heart. If it had been said he psalloed the carpenter’s chalk line, the bowstring, or a guitar, the physical action in each case would be the same but the object different. Is the *psalloing* in (Eph 5:19) spiritual? _____ Baptize is a verb. *God said baptize in _____.* *By stipulating water, did He not exclude everything else?* _____ *God said psallo in the _____.* *By stipulating the heart, did He not exclude all else?* _____ If God wanted us to *psallo* with a mechanical instrument, wouldn’t He have made that instrument(s) the object of the verb in one of the four verses where it is mentioned? _____ While possible to psallo on a musical instrument, it is not permitted unless God condones it.
6. **The 1 Corinthian 14:15 Use Of Psallo** “*What is it then? I will _____ with the _____, and I will pray with the understanding also: I will sing with the _____, and I will sing with the _____ also.*” Psallo is found twice in this verse and translated _____ each time. The great Baptist preacher, Spurgeon, remarked, “*I would as soon pray to God with machinery as to sing to God with machinery.*” This verse prompted his comment. It is pretty obvious that no subliminal message authorizing instrumental music is hidden in this verse. What lesson is Paul teaching regarding prayer and singing? _____
7. **The Romans 15:9 Use Of Psallo** “*And that the _____ might _____ God for his mercy; as it is written, For this cause I will _____ to thee among the Gentiles, and sing unto thy name.*” Again, the GK verb psallo is translated _____, not play. This quotation of (Ps 18:49) has David impersonating (ie: speaking as) Jesus and pointing to the time when the Jews and Gentiles will be united in the body of Christ. The singing unto God is praise and thanksgiving for this unity. Is there even a smidgen of a hint that mechanical music is somehow in this verse? _____
8. **The James 5:13 Use Of Psallo** “*Is any among you afflicted? let him pray. Is any merry? let him sing psalms.*” In this fifth and final usage in the NT we find psallo being translated to _____. Does this verse ask, “*Is any merry? Let him make instrumental music.*”? _____ Singing is done with the _____ and the melody is made in the _____. James never hints at mechanical music in addressing the attitude and demeanor of the participating Christian who is commanded to sing.
